

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# About the 25th Bath Film Festival

from Philip Raby, Creative Director

In 1991, a quarter of a century ago, in a world where there was no internet, social media. downloads or all the other stuff we now take for granted, Bath Film Festival was born. And here we are 25 years later, celebrating an anniversary we could never have dreamed of back in those pre-millennial days.

In 1991, we showed a grand total of one F-Rated film. In 2015, 40% of the programme is F-Rated - one of our proudest achievements, the F-Rating is awarded to films which have a

female director, and/or writer. and/or women on screen in their own right, or, ideally, a combination of all three. In a world where men's stories dominate, we are determined to help redress the balance.

This year's programme is - as ever - sensational. We have an astounding mix of previews, documentaries, children's films. and titles from around the world that you will either see before anyone else, or would never have had the chance to see on the big screen in Bath, till now,

Some of the highlights this year include: Goodnight Mommy, a scary and compelling Austrian film; Couple in a Hole which wowed audiences in Toronto: Güeros, an edgy Mexican film which won Best New Feature in Berlin, and Lamb (pictured), the first ever Ethiopian film to show at Cannes, plus read on to Find Your Film!



The dream team combination of director Ben Wheatley and actor Tom Hiddleston is what gives this realisation of J G Ballard's dystopian novel its irresistible edge. Wheatley's work includes Sightseers (shown at BFF 2012), Kill List and A Field In England, not to mention a couple of Dr Who episodes. Hiddleston's roles range from Loki in The Avengers movies to starring in the new Del Toro film, and appearing as Hank Williams in a new biopic. Jeremy Irons and Sienna Miller co-star as inhabitants of a tower block in the middle of a community that is falling apart, as the Thatcherite world outside becomes increasingly dedicated to the cult of self-interest.

Spender's marvellous documentary is set in the Italian town of Siena, where the annual Palio horse race takes place. Its roots go back hundreds of years. Spectators support the rider from their region, and dress up in medieval costumes. Meanwhile, the riders prepare for the three lap, ninety second, hell-for-leather, anything goes race. Two key characters dominate the film. Gigi plays the system, bribes, cheats and does whatever it takes to win. Giovanni, on the other hand, is younger, more idealistic yet equally determined to emerge as the winner. Paolo Sorrentino's new film is about anything but youth. Michael Caine plays Fred Ballinger, a world famous composer and conductor who has retired and is relaxing at a spa with his friend Mick (Harvey Keitel). Their visitors and guests include Rachel Weisz as Fred's daughter, Paul Dano as a film star trying to make sense of life, and Jane Fonda as an unreconstructed diva. Sorrentino has created both a beautiful and reflective film that draws comparisons with Thomas Mann's Death In Venice. Caine is on fine form as a man looking over the edge of existence, and he and Keitel have an enjoyably feisty old-bloke friendship that is a joy to observe.

Dying at 27 has become the stereotype for rock stars, from Jim Morrison to Kurt Cobain. One of the few women among this sad crew is

Janis Joplin, who arguably possessed one of the most powerful and unforgettable voices in modern music. This new documentary, coming as it does in the year that Amy has been such a runaway success, is another stark testament to the vast discrepancy between public performance and inner turmoil. Janis was like all of us, in that she wanted to be loved for herself. But in a world where cool guys wanted hot chicks, she was the wallflower. This wonderful new film (premiered at LFF in October) tells Janis's story in an honest and nonjudgmental way, allowing us to truly see the woman whose voice will blow you out of your seat.


Ten year old twins Elias and Lukas welcome home their mother from reconstructive facial surgery, her head still swathed in bandages.

After experiments with harnessing gravity as an alternate energy source go awry, the survivors are forced underground to avoid the now inhospitable surface. Some, like Patema, live their lives without seeing the blue sky. That is, until she adventures too far in to the forbidden territory and finds herself falling towards it. Will she find a way of escaping this upside down world? Is it really Patema who's inverted? Written and directed by the talented Yasuhiro Yoshiura (Time of Eve), this is an example of Japanese anime at its finest. If you like Studio Ghibli, you'll love this. Beautifully animated, touching, thrilling and thoroughly engaging, it has something for everyone. Suitable for families, although young children may find some sequences frightening.

Jafar Panahi doesn't give up easily. Forbidden to make films by the Iranian government who resent his portrayal of Iran as something less than perfect (eg Offside, about women who try to sneak into football matches), he continues to find ways to circumvent what would have defeated most people. After the deceptively titled This Is Not A Film and the secluded Closed Curtain, Panahi has ventured onto the streets in the guise of a taxi driver. He drives around Tehran, picking up passengers, chatting to them or listening to them, and capturing a portrait of his country that is funny, fascinating and authentic - like the man himself.

John and Karen live in a hole, in the woods, O&A in France, in the middle of nowhere. John takes charge of foraging for food - rabbits, roots, nuts, whatever he can find - while Karen stays inside the hole, doing strange things with rabbit skins. He seems resourceful; she is definitely petrified. The reason for their predicament is not immediately made clear, keeping you intrigued from the first minute. Especially when you discover that there is a small town not far away and that the natives are quite friendly. The film was a breakout hit at Toronto this year and is reviewed by Benjamin Lee as 'A poignant and freshly told film about the devastating power of loss'. Director Tobias Lindholm (A Hijacking, The Hunt and several Borgen episodes) weaves the two starkly different situations together delicately. managing to make the emotional impact of one spread to the other, gradually building up a swathe of feelings that are all the more powerful when they come together again. 

This story of three blind women captures many different elements of existence – being unable to see; living

in Cuba as a woman; finding joy in adversity; making meaning in darkness. These women approach life with such inspiring joy even though they have been denied the simple ability to see. One performs in a singing competition with so much happiness and energy, it is enough to make you swear you'll never complain again. Another has a boyfriend who is also blind and wants to be independent of her mother. The third is an older woman who has much to be sad about but treats life as a friend, not an opponent. Jennifer Redfearn has created a disarmingly simple, touching and universal film. As Elijah Davidson of *Brehm Center* says, 'If you give yourself over to it, the film is quite exhilarating.'

#### Inside the music of a world-class orchestra

This remarkable film follows the Royal Concertgebouw Orchestra of Amsterdam on a world tour to celebrate

its 125th anniversary. With admirers in every corner of the globe the destinations are diverse - Buenos Aires. Soweto, St Petersburg - but the strength of the film lies in its ability to tell individual stories, like that of the percussionist and the taxi driver, alongside the bigger picture of the orchestra's magnificent impact and influence. 


This is no ordinary martial arts film.

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








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
